National Medal of Arts winner Mark di Suvero's new sculpture, Luney Breakout, is on view at the Paula Cooper Gallery until Oct. 22. It's the latest in di Suvero's (pictured above) collection of monstrous abstract works, a towering, six-metre composition of weathered, rusting beams combined with curls of torqued metal. To add some depth to the exhibit, some of di Suvero's colourful paintings will be shown alongside the industrial piece. To see more of the artist's work. plan a side trip to the sculpture park Storm King Art Center in Mountainville, N.Y. paulacoopergallery.com




DEVENTER, THE NETHERLANDS

Single-room hotels are the focus of Lucy in the Sky, a collaboration between architects and visual artists in a harbour town in eastern Netherlands. Each room is unique: Lucy Cube is perched on a grain hopper with views of the harbour. Inside, you'll find a pantry, bathroom and shower. Lucy GLXY sits atop a former factory on the Noordzeestraat, the main drag leading to the harbour district. Guests get scenic views from the balcony and from their Dutch-made Auping bed. The largest suite (at 269 square feet) is Lucy PWR, which has solar panelling, a Scandinavian-style design and a kitchen. Rates start from \$214 (€150). Elucv.nl



LONDON

An in-depth retrospective of Rembrandt's late works begins at the National Gallery Oct. 15 and runs until Jan. 18. Approximately 40 paintings, 20 drawings and 30 prints created by the artist from the 1650s to his death are on loan from private collections and a number of international museums. Among the must-sees are The Jewish Bride (one of Vincent van Gogh's favourites), Portrait of a Lady with a Lap Dog (on loan from the Art Gallery of Ontario) and two self-portraits (Self Portrait at the Age of 63 is pictured above), which reveal how Rembrandt perceived his own old age. SIDNEY, B.C.

Purple starfish, giant green anemones and sea lions are highlights on OuterShores Expedition's new October sailings through the Southern Gulf Islands archipelago. Geared to nature lovers, this five night journey (\$1,995 a person) provides plenty of time at sea aboard a classic wooden schooner with stops on land to explore Portland Island's beach and forest walks on foot. Expert naturalists lead sea kayaking excursions around Gulf Islands National Park Reserve and on-board meals feature ingredients that are organic and locally sourced, outershores.ca
